

LENT & SEASON OF SIGNIFICANCE

Lent holds a profound place in the life of the Orthodox Church, serving as a season of spiritual renewal, repentance, and preparation for the celebration of Christ's Resurrection at Pascha (Easter). Unlike fleeting modern observances, Lent in Orthodoxy is a deeply immersive journey, spanning forty days—mirroring Christ's fasting in the wilderness—followed by Holy Week, which culminates in the triumphant proclamation of "Christ is Risen!" This period, known as Great Lent, is not merely a tradition but a transformative encounter with God, woven into the fabric of Orthodox theology, worship, and daily practice.

A Time of Repentance and Return

At its core, Lent in the Orthodox Church is about returning to God. The season begins with the Sunday of the Publican and the Pharisee, a parable that sets the tone by emphasizing humility over self-righteousness. This is followed by weeks of preparatory Sundays, each with a distinct focus—such as the Prodigal Son or the Last Judgment—guiding the faithful toward self-examination. The church teaches that humanity, created in God's image, has fallen into sin, and Lent offers a path back to communion with the Divine. Repentance, or metanoia, is not just regret but a reorientation of the soul, a turning away from worldly distractions toward eternal life.

The services of Lent, especially the Great Canon of Saint Andrew of Crete, amplify this call. Recited in the first week and again in the fifth, the Canon is a poetic dialogue between the soul and God, recounting biblical stories of sin and redemption. Its haunting refrain—"Have mercy on me, O God, have mercy on me"—echoes through dimly lit churches, where flickering candles and prostrations create an atmosphere of solemn introspection. For Orthodox Christians, Lent is not a burden but a gift: a chance to shed the weight of sin and draw closer to the One who offers forgiveness.

The Role of Fasting

Fasting is the heartbeat of Orthodox Lent, though it's far more than dietary restriction. From Clean Monday—the day Lent begins—believers abstain from meat, dairy, fish (with some exceptions), wine, and oil on most days, adhering to a vegan-like diet rooted in simplicity. This isn't about legalism; it's about discipline and freedom. The body, as Saint Paul writes, is a "temple of the Holy Spirit," and fasting tames its desires, redirecting focus from physical indulgence to spiritual hunger. The Orthodox view is holistic: what we eat affects how we pray, think, and love.

Yet fasting extends beyond food. The church encourages fasting from anger, gossip, and pride, urging almsgiving and forgiveness as companions to abstinence. The Forgiveness Vespers, held on the eve of Clean Monday, is a striking ritual where parishioners seek forgiveness as well as offering forgiveness. This act embodies the Lenten ethos:

reconciliation with God begins with reconciliation among people. In a world of division, this practice stands out as a radical witness to Christ's command to love one's neighbor.

Liturgical Life and Spiritual Ascent

Lent transforms the rhythm of Orthodox worship. The Divine Liturgy, typically vibrant with hymns of resurrection, gives way to the more somber Liturgy of the Presanctified Gifts, celebrated on weekdays. Its muted tones and frequent silences reflect the penitential mood, while the frequent use of Psalm 51—"Create in me a clean heart, O God"—underscores the longing for renewal. Sundays remain a respite, with the full Liturgy of Saint Basil or Saint John Chrysostom, reminding the faithful that even in fasting, the joy of Christ's presence endures.

The Triodion, a liturgical book guiding the season, shapes this ascent toward Pascha. Each week highlights a milestone—such as the Triumph of Orthodoxy (celebrating icons) or the Sunday of Saint John Climacus (honoring ascetic struggle)—building momentum toward Holy Week. By the fifth week, with the hymn "Lord of the Powers, be with us," the faithful sense they're nearing the cross and the empty tomb. Lent becomes a microcosm of the Christian life: a pilgrimage through struggle to glory.

Preparing for Pascha

Ultimately, Lent in the Orthodox Church is preparatory. It's not an end in itself but a means to enter the mystery of Christ's Passion and Resurrection. Holy Week intensifies this, with daily services recounting the Last Supper, Crucifixion, and burial, until the midnight Paschal Liturgy erupts in light and song. The fast breaks with a feast—lamb, red eggs, and joyous greetings—symbolizing victory over death. Yet this joy is earned through Lent's labor. The forty days strip away illusions, teaching that true life comes through dying to self, just as Christ did.

For Orthodox Christians, Lent is a mirror reflecting both human frailty and divine grace. It's a season of paradox: mourning leads to rejoicing, hunger to fullness, descent to ascent. In a culture obsessed with instant gratification, Lent stands as a counterpoint, inviting believers to slow down, look inward, and reach upward. Its significance lies not in rules or rituals but in the promise it holds: that through repentance, fasting, and prayer, the soul can taste the resurrection even now.

FOCUS ON PHILOPTOCHOS HELP US TO HELP OTHERS

Agape Forward, March 2025 Philoptochos News

History fascinates me – blame that on being born a Greek. Levity aside, as the ancient philosopher stated, the more one lives, the more one learns. March, is an auspicious month for our Orthodox faith and Greek heritage. It is a perfect time to learn about two such luminaries: St. Philothei of Athens (1522-1589) and James Jakob Williams (1785/1800 - 1829). In times of darkness, St. Philothei brought hope and salvation. And when Greece was at the precipice of independence James Jakob Williams proved a fierce friend.



St. Philothei (Άγια Φιλοθέη η Αθηναία), was born Rinoula Benizelos. The only child to a family able to thrive under the Turkish Occupation. Her upbringing was unique. Not only was she steeped in traditional female roles, but her father also ensured that she had a formal education. However, as was the custom, she was married at 14. Her husband turned out to be cruel and her marriage ended three years later when he died. She returned to her family and made it clear that she would never marry again. Indeed, she took to heart Jesus' message of love for others and dedicated herself to charity.

After the death of her parents, she turned her home into the first school for women in Europe. She understood that all people needed to read, write, and have a viable means of providing sustenance for themselves and their families. Originally designated as a school for Christian women, the Turkish authorities allowed her to operate quietly. However, when she refused to turn away Muslim women needing solace from abusive husbands, and when she used her holdings to go to the slave ports and "buy" people to set them free, she became a challenge to authorities. Rather than escape and have her

wards face persecution, St. Philothei was martyred for her faith. Through her faith and actions, St. Philothei helped hundreds of people prosper.

James Jakob Williams (1785/1800 - 1829), while secular, is also important to us, both as Greeks and as Americans. A slave in the United States, Mr. Williams, fought for and died a hero for Greece's Independence. As a young man, Mr. Williams escaped from the Maryland plantation that held him in bondage and hid on the USS Guerriere. He fought bravely, and his commander recommended he stay in Greece, where slavery had been abolished. A brave and dedicated soldier, he was able to infiltrate the enemies and share information with the Greek command, help liberate Nafpaktos, and secure the ship Sotir Williams Greeks Mr. for the died from wounds during fighting the (https://www.eefshp.org/en/african-americans-and-the-greek-revolution/).



March 25 honors our faith, a faith that, as St. Philothei's biography points out, is steeped in the belief that ALL people have a right to experience the Agape of our Lord. March 25 also honors our independence. An independence that, as James Jakob Williams' story teaches, expands beyond the boundaries of nationalism or race. As we continue to grow in our faith and our own stories, may these two models help us.

Philoptochos is excited to share our annual March 25 luncheon, this year hosted on Sunday, 3/23. Proceeds from the meal and raffle will go to help the poor of Greece and Cyprus.
