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

THE SANCTITY OF LIFE: A SACRED TRUST IN A CONFUSED AGE

In every generation, the Church of Christ has borne witness to the sacredness of human life. In our time, however, this truth is under assault from many directions. From the tragedy of abortion to the horrors of war and violence, from the neglect of the poor to the dehumanizing tendencies of modern culture, we are witnessing a widespread forgetfulness of God's image in our neighbor. Orthodox Christians must recover the fullness of the Church's teaching: that every human life, at every stage and in every condition, is a divine gift to be reverenced, protected, and loved.

Life as a Divine Gift

The foundation of our Christian understanding of life begins in Genesis: "Then *God said*, 'Let us make man in Our image, according to Our likeness." (Genesis 1:26) Human life is not a human invention; it is bestowed by God Himself. Each person is created in His image and called into communion with Him. This reality gives every life inherent worth before birth and after, in sickness and in health, in strength and in weakness.

The early Church Fathers spoke with striking clarity about the sacredness of life. Saint Basil the Great wrote: "The one who destroys the fetus deliberately is guilty of murder. And any fine distinction between a formed and unformed child is not admissible among us." (Letter 188, Saint Basil the Great) Likewise, the Didache, one of the earliest Christian documents, commands: "You shall not murder a child by abortion nor kill that which is born." (Didache 2:2)

In an age when infanticide and abortion were commonplace in the Greco-Roman world, Christians stood apart. They recognized that to harm life at its earliest stages was to reject the image of God Himself.

The Sanctity of Life in All Its Dimensions

Yet the Church's vision extends far beyond the question of abortion. The same divine image that exists in the unborn child is also present in the refugee fleeing war, the elderly person alone in a nursing home, the homeless man on the street, and the stranger we pass each day. To ignore or harm any of these is to disregard Christ Himself, who tells us: "Truly, I say to you, as you did it to one of the least of these My brethren, you did it to Me." (Matthew 25:40)

Violence and War

From her earliest centuries, the Church has grieved over the bloodshed of war and interpersonal violence. Saint Basil, in his canonical letters, called soldiers returning from





battle to undergo penance, not because defending one's neighbor is evil, but because taking life, even in war, wounds the soul and contradicts our ultimate vocation to peace. Saint John Chrysostom exhorted Christians to reject hatred and violence: "Nothing is more foreign to a Christian than to seek revenge... He who loves his enemies is like unto God." (Homily on Matthew 18)

The Orthodox Church honors those who defend others with courage, but she never glorifies war itself. Violence whether in the womb, on the streets, or between nations, reveals humanity's tragic estrangement from God.

The Poor and the Marginalized

The Fathers were equally uncompromising when it came to neglecting the poor. Saint John Chrysostom famously preached: "Not to share our wealth with the poor is to steal from them and to take away their livelihood; it is not our own goods that we hold, but theirs." (Homily on Lazarus and the Rich Man) Saint Basil the Great, preaching during a famine, rebuked the rich for hoarding: "The bread you do not use is the bread of the hungry; the garment hanging in your wardrobe is the garment of the naked; the money you keep locked away is the money of the poor." (Homily on Luke 12:18)

For the Fathers, to ignore the suffering of the poor and homeless is not merely a failure of charity. It is a violation of the sanctity of life itself. To treat human beings as disposable or invisible is to deny the image of God.

A Unified Orthodox Vision

Abortion, violence, war, and neglect of the vulnerable may seem like separate moral issues, but in Orthodox teaching they share a single root: the failure to see every human being as an icon of Christ. Saint Gregory of Nyssa wrote: "The image of God is not found in one part of human nature, but in the entire human being." (On the Making of Man) This vision shapes our entire moral life. It calls us to reverence life in the womb, to work for peace in a violent world, to care for the poor, to comfort the elderly, and to welcome the stranger. It demands that our faith not remain a private sentiment, but be lived out through concrete acts of mercy and justice.

A Call to Faithful Witness

As Orthodox Christians, we are not called to conform to the shifting ideologies of the age. We are called to be the Church: a community that reveals Christ to the world through love, truth, and sacrificial service. This means forming our consciences according to Scripture and the Fathers, not political parties or cultural trends. It means standing for life in all its forms: protecting the unborn, opposing violence and hatred, caring for the poor, comforting the sick, and praying for peace. It means seeing Christ in every human face.

Saint Justin Martyr, writing to the Roman authorities in the second century, testified boldly: "We have been taught that it is wicked to expose newly-born children, for we would then be murderers." (First Apology, Chapter 27) If the early Christians could stand firm against the culture of death surrounding them, so can we—through grace, faith, and love.

Conclusion: The Sacred Trust

The sanctity of life is not merely a moral issue; it is a theological confession. Every person is created by God, redeemed by Christ, and destined for eternal communion with Him. To reverence life is to reverence God. As we enter this new season, let us recommit ourselves to this sacred trust: To protect life where it is threatened, To defend the vulnerable where they are forgotten, To bring the light of Christ into a world that has

grown dark. "Before I formed you in the womb I knew you, and before you were born I consecrated you." (Jeremiah 1:5)

May we be a beacon of this truth, a place where every person, from the smallest child to the most forgotten soul, encounters the love of God through us.
